San Juan County Teens in Need of Stable Homes

It's an invisible problem because we don't see them camping in the streets, but dozens of teens in San Juan County don't have a safe stable place to live. There are no programs or shelters in the county that can provide a safe place to live. They are vulnerable to sexual exploitation and struggle to stay in school. The San Juan County Five-Year Homelessness plan has a goal of starting a host home program, a solution used in some rural counties. League of Women Voters Convention May 2023



This past May, four of your League of Women Voters of the San Juan Islands had the privilege of representing our league at the Washington State Convention in Pasco/Tri-cities. Attending were LWVSJI Vice President Barbara Sharp, board members Necia Quast and Stephanie Butler, and member Leanne Brunette.

The SJI league attendees participated in workshops and presentations ranging from *Redistricting in Washington State* to

Understanding Public Hospital Districts to Engaging Youth and Putting DEI (Diversity, Equity and Inclusion) Into Practice. Delegates additionally were able to see samples of handouts, newsletters, and voter support materials produced by other leagues around the state, as well as hear an extraordinary presentation from Dr. Kimberly Hamlin, "Women Have Always Powered Democracy: A Brief History Before We Look Forward."

Perhaps most important, your SJI delegates brought two new issues to the state league, in the form of caucuses requesting action from the state league. The first was immigration, and LWVSJI President Susan Martin interrupted her vacation in Switzerland to join us via Zoom as we asked the state league to consider a study to examine the integration of immigrants into our state. The state league agreed unanimously that understanding what happens to immigrants once they arrive in Washington, and how we can support their integration into our communities and their associated economic success and ability to contribute to our larger state economy, is a matter the league should study.

The second caucus issue was that of reproductive rights of Washington state residents who live in communities served by hospitals with religious affiliations that do not allow provision

of birth control and other reproductive rights. The matter was considered, but our request for action was ultimately not approved by the convention delegates. While there was clear support for the issue among state delegates, it was not determined to be a priority at this time.

In total, the LWV Washington State convention was a wonderful learning and growing experience. The Convention noted members lost including LWVSJ members Louisa Nishitani and Robin Jacobson. The Convention elected new officers including a new state League President Mary Coltrane.

Your SJI delegates came home with many new ideas and new excitement about the importance of our work to empower voters and defend democracy. The atmosphere was welcoming, and it was easy to become part of the larger group. Your SJI Board strongly encourages all members to consider attending in the future.

Recap of our Annual Meeting on May 15th, 2023

Reflections from the President of LWVSJ:

On May 15, the League of Women Voters of the San Juans ended our fiscal year with our Annual Meeting. As with most of our gatherings, the Annual Meeting was in person and accessible via Zoom. We had a very good turnout at Brickworks and enthusiastic participation online. I thank all of you who participated.



My special thanks to Barbara Sharp, our Vice President, for stepping in at the last minute to preside over the meeting as I had a bad case of laryngitis. Thanks also to our two stellar speakers: Sheriff Eric Peter & San Juan County Prosecutor Amy Vira. They provided excellent updates on the work of their respective departments.

We started the meeting with the President's review of the year's accomplishments. To summarize, we had a banner year. We hosted monthly

meetings on an array of subjects of current concern: the State of Friday Harbor, Reproductive Health Post Roe v Wade, The Intersection of Art and Women's Rights, The Decline of Local News & Its Impact on Democracy and Saving the Salish Sea. We also hosted a well-attended Voters Forum on the San Juan County Sheriff's Race that had about 100 in-person participants and another 100 on Zoom. In November and January, we held members only sessions. The November retreat provided feedback on what activities LWVSJ should pursue in the future to reach as many county residents as possible. In January, we engaged in more specific program planning for our own League and provided input into the LWVWA program of action for 2023-2025.

These activities led to concrete action. First, LWVSJ launched the new Observer Corps, under the leadership of Necia Quast, former President of LWVSJ. Observers are individuals who attend a governmental meeting, note what happens at the meeting, and report back to the League and the community. The LWVSJ Observer Corp members attend city and county government meetings. Their observations are published by the principal news outlets in the county and are also available on our Facebook page.

Second, we participated actively in the process of consensus-building around two reports that LWVWA issued in this past year: Shoreline Management Act at 56+ Years (Shorelines Study 2022) and The Decline of Local News & Its Impact on Democracy. Following publication of studies, local Leagues typically hold meetings at which members of the study team answer questions about the study and members register their opinions on key issues. The responses are consolidated to frame a League position that allows the League to take action for or against specific legislation. LWVWA has taken a position on both issues based on our and other League input.

Third, LWVSJ applied for funding from the state Education Fund to help us improve our service to people throughout the county. The grant covers two major activities: Obtaining the technology and expertise needed to run hybrid meetings more effectively and developing a strategy for improving our website and social media presence to reach more people with better content. LWVSJ received \$2,000 from LWVWA Ed Fund to be matched by \$1,050 to be drawn from our reserves to undertake this initiative.

Fourth, LWVSJ has had a significant impact on the State League. In June 2022, LWVSJ drafted a resolution on reproductive rights that LWVWA submitted at the national convention. It was adopted by almost unanimous consent the day the Supreme Court decision was released. LWVSJ's Treasurer has been named LWVWA Treasurer for its 501c3 Education Fund. We also helped scope the State League's program of work for this coming year. Following the January program planning meeting, LWVSJ submitted a proposal to LWVWA that a study on immigration and immigrant integration be part of the program of work. Its purpose is to delve deeply into legislative options at the state level for enhancing the lives of immigrants and the role the League could be playing in ensuring immigrants have pathways to economic, social, and civic opportunities. The study was approved at the May 2023 LWVWA convention. I will be chairing the process.

We expect another active year as we begin our work with new and returning board members. I hope you will attend our speakers and members meetings. We are always looking for volunteers to help the Board put on our programs. If you have ideas of how we can be more supportive and effective in our outreach, please let me know. I look forward to working with all of you in the year ahead. Have a peaceful, happy and productive summer.
