### Bills We Oppose – Action Alert for this week

⚠️ **[SB 5961](#) Incentivizing the use of biochar in government contracts.** Bill passed the Senate on 2/10/22: yeas, 49; nays, 0; absent, 0; excused, 0.

**The bill is now moving through the House.** It is scheduled for a public hearing on 2/21 at 1:30 PM in the House Committee on State Government & Tribal Relations.

Comments: We have a concern that this bill is incentivizing a private company’s efforts to develop a biochar/biomass plant in Port Angeles. There is concern that the bill will allow the harvesting of trees to supply feedstock for the plant, rather than using logging slash or other wood waste. Regardless of the benefits of biochar, these biochar operations could lead to stripping massive amounts of vital organic material out of forests.

### Bills We Support – Action Alert for this week

**[SB 5619](#) Conserving and restoring kelp forests and eelgrass meadows in Washington state.** Bill had a public hearing on 1/20/22 in the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Water, Natural Resources & Parks Committee. It was referred to Senate Ways & Means on 1/28/22. Referred to Rules Committee; on 2/10/22, the 2<sup>nd</sup> substitute bill was placed on third reading. **The bill passed:** yeas, 49; nays, 0; absent, 0; excused, 0.

**The bill is now moving through the House.** It had a public hearing on 2/18/22 in the House Committee on Rural Development, Agriculture & Natural Resources.

**It is scheduled for a vote in executive session on 2/23 at 10:00 AM.**

**Comments:** Both native and non-native types of eelgrass are essential for restoring Puget Sound and Coastal Washington. It is in these back eddies and sloping beaches where eelgrass provides shelter for migrating fish where they can escape diving ducks, seals and other predators. The loss in Puget Sound of any kind of eelgrass is partly responsible for the decline of Pacific salmon in our state. The goal to conserve and restore at least 10,000 acres of kelp and eelgrass meadows by 2040 should include both native and non-native species of eelgrass.
